“When posed with great challenges, we create greater opportunities”. These were my words published in the last issue of the Michigan Overseas Veteran.

Today, I can proudly say the VFW Department of Michigan and Auxiliary have proven that statement true. In the middle of a pandemic that has shuttered much of this Nation, the VFW Department of Michigan hosted our annual Fall Conference at Boyne Highlands Resort. We did so safely and successfully, for what some

have said to have been the best Fall Conference our organization has hosted in many years.

We were joined by Veterans of Foreign Wars Commander in-Chief, Hal Roesch. Commander Roesch continued to share his message that we treat all of our Comrades with Dignity and Respect. For that we are grateful, and this Department is proud to continue turning his words into action.

Chuck Hagel, the Former Secretary of Defense, retired United States Senator and Life Member of the VFW, recorded a video that we played for attendees. In it, he applauded this Department for our efforts to continue serving veterans, their families and communities, and reminded us of our place as leaders in our communities. Specifically, he noted the important role we can and should play in being the unifying voices to bring our country together. Jared Lyon, the Chief Executive Officer of Student Veterans of America (SVA) also recorded a video for us. Jared, a Navy veteran, spoke of his pride in being a member of this great organization, and affirmed his commitment to ensure the partnership the VFW has nationally, is fully deployed at the Department, District and Post levels; connecting our proud VFW Posts, with the blood, energy and enthusiasm of student veterans; who some have started to call the “Next Greatest Generation”.

The VFW has had several major inflection points in our proud 120 year history. The first came with the creation of several smaller veterans organizations, which were formed by veterans returning from the Spanish-American War. The next came as these organizations merged in 1913, creating the Veterans of Foreign Wars. We grew again with the close of World War I. As World War II ended, the VFW experienced explosive growth, buttressed by Korean War Veterans in the decade to follow, thus laying the massive footprint that we know of the organization today. Sadly, we lost a generation, as we did not welcome our Comrades home from the Vietnam War, as we should have.

Today, our leadership encompasses those Vietnam veterans who ultimately did join the VFW, and we are now transitioning the helm to the Gulf War generation.

The inflection point we face today, is of our choosing. For the past two decades, Iraq and Afghanistan veterans have returned from war and their time in uniform. In some cases we have welcomed them in with open arms, but in many more, we collected their membership dues, but didn’t pause to ask them what they needed. In most cases, they needed the same things we needed when we returned home: help in finding a job, starting a business, transitioning to college, or assistance with childcare.

The inflection point our organization has been facing in recent years, is not the explosive growth seen over 75 years ago, but is instead the result of not having a plan in place as our Comrades from previous generations moved on from this world. As they left, the blood that kept many of our posts thriving left with them. The pandemic is having a detrimental effect on our posts, but for many, this is seeming to be the tipping point of which they had been teetering on for a number of years.

Today, we have a choice. We can choose to continue doing things the way we have always done them. Alternatively, we can adopt this newest generation of warfighters into our organization by asking them what they need, helping them with their businesses and getting jobs and supporting their families; and as they join and pick up the mantle, they will bring with them the technological firepower and ... continued on next page

DEPARTMENT CHAPLAIN, JENNIFER SMITH

In the last issue of the MOV, this Chaplain's article focused upon sustainability and member involvement, particularly during a time of COVID. This article will touch upon viability factors within our organization and change from a spiritual and business perspective.

Regarding the need for organizations to have people, Schermerhorn, Hunt, and Osborn (2003) state "that even in the age of high technology, people are the indispensable human resources whose knowledge and performance advance the organization's purpose, mission, and strategies" (p. 8). This means that even a group (including Posts, misc.) with few workers must have dedicated and properly motivated stakeholders to reach desired objectives. In business, an excellent example is Amazon, which succeeds due to strong employee--leadership and followership--collaboration (Deutschman, 2004). Clearly, an organization cannot reach optimization in spite of its workforce. You are each needed, as you can give! As 2 Corinthians 9:7 (ESV) states, "Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

Moreover, people can be empowered by organizational interactions. For the Veterans of Foreign Wars, this construct includes volunteer efforts to achieve our worthy organizational goals, including support for veterans and troops and their families, and other patriotic outreach. In addition to society benefiting from the goods or services, the volunteers benefit from the socialization. Mook (1987) contends, in many instances,

organizations help fulfill certain levels of Maslow's hierarchy of needs by providing security, safety, socialization, and esteem (citing Maslow, 1943). Specifically, the VFW and/or Auxiliary offer positive outlets for selfless service unto others that touch the hearts of those that give and receive. "Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you," Luke 6:38.

I cannot think of an instance that where organizations do not need people or vice versa. Therefore, we often need to simply get out of own way; being open to positive change and, with discernment/as applicable, putting away toxic 'we've always done it that way' mindsets. What does the past behavior offer that we negate the present? Memories are gifts. They can teach and/or gladden. However, they can also encumber us -- as weights on a raft -- if we do not view them objectively. What does that mean? Our VFW organizational traditions are important; rather, this point relates to our informal behaviors (leadership/followership styles) that sometimes interfere with growth. Change is sometimes painful but, like a painted portrait, if you focus only on the emptiness of the background you cannot appreciate the full beauty.

Commander Gloger, Sr. Vice Conklin and Jr. Vice Griffith have spent a great deal of time dedicated towards bringing new members and leaders

with diverse skill sets into the Department, and towards bringing our organization up to speed technologically. To that end, I'd like to share with you some of the things we'll be working on for the next few months.

First, we have the goal of making your jobs as leaders and volunteers easier and more efficient. We're seeking to identify processes that are inefficient, redundant in nature, or where our organization has not kept up with tools that could easily reduce the time our Department, District and Post officers spend on administrative functions.

Project Management: As an example, in the first few months of joining Department headquarters, I found the sheer volume and totality of the moving parts of the organization nearly overwhelming. With twelve districts, multiple programs, posts running into financial issues, along with keeping up to date on the Department's reporting and finances, the idea of trying to keep it all in our heads felt futile.

To combat this information/task overload, we integrated a project management tool to help Department leadership stay on top of things. We are now able to create and assign tasks, set deadlines, attach images and documents, track projects, and provide updates in real time, all of which can be done from our smartphones.

Online Payments & Registering for Events: One of the other issues several officers and members have raised is "I can buy my cat toys online, why can't I make transactions with the Department that way as well?". Well, you're going to be able to soon! We're also setting up online registrations for conferences and events, and we'll be testing that out in the coming months, as we launch a series of Zoom training modules to help you from everything from managing your post's social media, setting up your own project management tools for your post or district, to training on how to file your 990s.

Some members have shared that they aren't sure they'll be able to keep up with the computer stuff we're shifting towards. To them and to you, I say "**we will not leave anyone behind.**" As we choose different tools for the organization to use, we're only going to be using tools that are simple and safe to use. Anyone who is interested and is willing to learn will be supported.

Finally, we're looking for the problems that get in your way or slow you down in executing your mission of serving veterans, their families and your communities. We have started this membership year very well. As of Oct 13, we were ranked 15th in National standings at 85.34%. We have been climbing slowly everyday which is great! We already have 159 new members this year, along with 29 reinstatements. Even in these tough times we have been able to attract new members and get some of our past members back.

Commander Gloger has announced his Commander challenge to all Posts. All Post that are 95% with at least one new member on December 31st will have their Post number put in a hat. We will pick one out at our Winter Convention, one way or another. The winning Post will receive \$100 from Department.

However, veterans and their families are resilient and whenever given lemons have some fantastic ways of making lemonade. We can complain about how the virus has curtailed our efforts to meet our responsibilities toward our programs, such as Patriots Pen/Voice of Democracy, community service or our recruiting efforts. Or we can stop complaining and meet the challenge through innovation. Telephones and the internet still work! Schools can be contacted and the PP/VOD program marketed through telephone calls and emails. PDC Croyle offered up a great idea; if you meet resistance in selling the PP/VOD program to school administrators or teachers, contact the members of the Parent Teachers Association. When little Johnny or Mary goes to college Moms and Dads are going to foot the bill unless scholarship money is available. Our VOD/PP programs offer those scholarships. When

our members stop coming to meetings over their concern of "the virus", start "zooming" your meetings so your members can tune in and participate. When recruiting and you get resistance with the "I don't have time to attend meetings" excuse, emphasis that in order to protect their veterans rights and benefits we need their numbers, and they can tune-in to a zoom meeting as their time permits. In other words, as we did in the military-adapt and overcome.

One other area of concern I would like to address to our members is the use of social media. Remember what you put on Facebook or other social media platforms does not go away. If you make inappropriate remarks or offer up offensive posts or even "like" someone else's post that is inappropriate or offensive, this can reflect adversely on the VFW. Even if you are using a group or platform not connected with the VFW. It doesn't take much to check who your friends are and when your friends list contain a majority of members reflecting their affiliation with the VFW that can and will reflect badly on our organization.

It was a pleasure to see so many participants at the Fall Conference in person and I am looking forward to a Mid-Winter conference in whatever form it might take. Please continue to "Move Forward" and stay safe.

You may not be able to physically visit a sick comrade but if you give them a call or even email those Comrades to find out how they are, report it. Have you sent someone in the hospital, nursing home or home a nice bouquet of flowers, if so report it, let me know how much was spent for the flowers. Posts that have hospital supplies and equipment make sure that you are reporting those donations, remember only equipment that is loaned out can be reported, not the inventory in your post. This guide will give you detailed guidelines on how to report your VOD/PP/TOY/Buddy Poppy and VSM donations. ONLY the Adjutant of the POST, DISTRICT AND DEPARTMENT...can do the input into this dashboard...so, please download this manual and fill out your portions as required.

There is a big change to this year’s program on the Teacher of the Year. It is not a National Program and no credit for All-American is a requirement to make ALL-AMERICAN on the dashboard. The program will be handled just as the program states and winners will get the acknowledgment and awards...so, please submit your teachers as you would normally do.

I would also like to remind everyone doing the judging as to the time requirements, and all the do’s and don’ts when listening to and reading the students entries. Please make sure that the students forms are legible and that the students have the parents Name, Address, Phone # and a good email address that is not from the student’s schools so I can contact them after school hours if needed.

Post’s must make sure that you submit all documentation required to include what the Post spends on the awards banquet when submitting their entries to district. This is also required from the Districts to have all documents filled out and submitted with the District Winner to Department.

Speaking of reports, most of you know by now that we have a new reporting system this year. It was designed to report one activity at a time and those are specifically your Program Achievements. There is a “V&FS – Other” to report items that do not fall within your goals. Due to the constraints of the reporting system, the drop-down menu is only a brief synopsis of the actual achievements, so you really need to refer to your Guide Sheet and the listed Achievements so you are reporting accurately.

ANDY CONKLIN

The Veterans of Foreign Wars has a very strong and respectable voice in Washington, if you don’t think so, just look at our track record in the Legislative Victories, recently they passed,

S.785 The Cmdr. John Hannon mental *Health Care Improvement Act*, this act will give the VA the authority and resources to expand suicide prevention efforts, and expand Telehealth capabilities to Veterans in rural areas. We hope and pray this will be a valuable tool for the VA to reduce suicides.

H.R. 3228, The *VA Mission Telehealth Clarification Act* would expand the VA MISSION Act of 2018’s authority for health professions trainees to provide treatment via telemedicine.

H.R. 6092, *Veteran’s Prostate Cancer Treatment and Research Act* would establish a national clinical pathway for prostate cancer within VA.

H.R. 5245, the *SHIELD for Veterans Act* would reform the VA’s debt collection process.

H.R. 7105 would provide VA with flexibility while caring for homeless veterans during a covered public health emergency.

H.R. 8247, the *Veterans COMPACT Act* of 2020 would further improve support during the transition from service member to veteran, suicide prevention and mental well-being initiatives, and care and services for women veterans.

H.R. 3798, the *Equal Access to Contraception for Veterans Act* would ensure the same no-

cost contraceptive care for women veterans as required by non-veteran health insurance plans.

When I was in Washington this March, I met face to face with many of our Michigan Congressional Leaders as well as our State Senator Gary Peters and a Legislative Representative from Sen Stabenow’s office. Many of them wanted to reassure me the media was not running the show in Washington and they all got along just fine regardless of party affiliation.

I cannot over emphasize the importance of keeping abreast of what our legislators are doing for US! Staying in touch with the people we have elected and sent to Washington to **represent us**, has never been more important. With all the internet and different sources of media available, we have the availability to view their actions or their lack of them daily. You can look at what bills are being presented and how they may affect us as Veterans or as just citizens.

If you haven’t yet please sign up for the Action Corp Weekly, it’s so simple. Log onto the VFW.org web site, click on Grassroots Advocacy then click join, a form will drop down, fill it out hit submit and now you will receive the VFW Action Core weekly a weekly updated report on VFW concerns. While your logged in navigate in the Advocacy site and see what we’re doing, it may surprise you.

Again, the 10th of the month is a hard deadline, if you run into some problems let me know and we can work things out.

Please use the online reporting system or the forms provided on the Department website. **All other forms should be discarded and NO “homemade” forms or changing the ones provided!** And PLEASE, if you must send in a handwritten report make sure it is legible! Right now it takes 80% of my time to do 20% of the reports being done on the old forms or even on the new forms that are handwritten. It is 2020 and like it or not the computers are here to stay. If you don’t know how to use one, learn how. Most

senior centers have classes. Libraries have computers you can use. If you don’t want to learn, have your kids or grandkids do it for you. I think that you will find out it’s much easier than you think and you might find out that you enjoy learning something new!

All the information about reporting is provided in the program section of the Department webpage.

Lately I have noticed that some posts are not claiming the monetary value of their hall donations. For example, numerous posts will report that they donate their hall to the Scouts for their meetings and fail to report the monetary value of the hall. If you would charge a \$400.00 rental fee to the public then you can claim a \$400.00 value for your donation. The same goes for anytime that you donate your hall. Don’t cheat yourself.

Another common mistake I see is on reporting funerals, if your post did 6 funerals with 4 comrades at each funeral the report

should be 24 members and if each funeral was 2 hours then you should report 48 hours and if the average miles driven were 10 to each funeral then you would claim 240 miles, again don’t cheat yourself. Now on the other hand, I still have posts reporting going to district meetings, letting the auxiliary use their hall etc. these are NOT reportable. Post fundraisers are not reportable unless the profits are going to the relief fund or earmarked for a Veteran in need etc.

Again, I do not take hospital reports and again they will NOT be forwarded to the Hospital Director, Don Martindale.

If you have any questions please don’t hesitate to contact me and if you leave a message please make sure that you mention the VFW (I’ve been getting tons of telemarketer messages) and I hope that everybody is in good health and staying safe.

AUXILIARY SCHOLARSHIP CHAIR / EVELYN AVERY

The winning entry of the 2019-20 VFW Auxiliary National Organization Young Creative Patriotic Art Contest was announced at the National Convention in Kansas on July 21, 2020 to be from the Department of Michigan! Sponsored by VFW Auxiliary 6248 in Decatur, Michigan - Congratulations to Allison Mroczek on winning the first-place \$15,000 scholarship!

Allison describes her artwork as a graphite and colored pencil drawing. The drawing captures a distraught woman veteran who cannot express her feelings, after serving in the US Marines. She suffers from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. She is kneeling down to see her reflection in a water puddle and horrific flashbacks from Iraq instantly hit her. While in the U.S. Marines she trained a military working dog that she became attached to. The reflection in the puddle conveys a difficult time when a bomb exploded in the distance. Fortunately, she made it out in time. However, her canine companion did not make it out alive. Her therapy dog, a golden retriever seated next to her is portrayed in a sad manner, because the dog senses the soldier's grief. The Soldier feels incapable of opening up to another animal, fearing it will leave her heart-broken once again. The woman grips a dog collar in her hand that once belonged to her K-9.

The soldier wears three faith-related

bracelets on her wrist. The bracelets represent promises from God that give her hope and remind her that no matter what she goes through, God will bring her through the difficult times. In Allison's portrait, she drew the top in pencil to convey how experiencing PTSD can make life seem colorless and dull. The battlefield remains in color to show how impactful, recent, and monumental that horrendous day appears in the soldier's eyes.

Allison stated she hopes this portrait of this American Hero will show that Freedom comes with a cost. Some veterans have physical injuries, while some have emotional scars that stay hidden inside and are hard to heal. Allison's future plans are to attend either Grace College or Bethel University where she will use her scholarship from the Young American Creative Patriotic Art Contest. She is considering studying Communications and Art. Her hopes are to either be an Activities Director at an Assisted Living Facility, work with a Non-Profit Christian Art Organization, or work with Christian Art Ministries in other countries

Allison said "Ever since I was able to hold a pencil I've loved to draw. I hope to encourage and enrich people's lives with the amazing love and hope God gives us and the wonderful art He helps us create!"

I want to stop for a moment and talk about an Issue that came up at our National Council workshops and where the National Council of Administration had to vote on the removal of high-ranking officer in a department. The issue is sexual harassment. The Veterans of Foreign Wars will not tolerate sexual harassment.

On October 15th, I will be leaving for the Big Ten Conference in Columbus, Ohio. At this Big Ten Conference, the Delegates of the Big Ten Departments will be electing a Big Ten Vice Chairman, Big Ten Secretary/Treasurer, and a Big Ten Chaplain. Richard Uzl, our Current Big Ten Secretary/Treasurer is Retiring after serving (7) years. Also, the Current Big Ten Vice Chairman Dan Kramer will be moving up to Big Ten Chairman for 2020-2021.

I now want to talk about MEMBERSHIP. On September 29th, 2020, I looked at Memstats on the VFW National Website. National was at 81.74%. National Membership Total was at 854,481 Members. Our Goal is to help Commander-in-Chief Hal Roesch achieve his goal of 100% by June 30, 2021. That is 190,763 additional members. WE CAN DO IT! MICHIGAN CAN HELP COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF HAL ROESCH ACHIEVE HIS GOAL OF 100%.

On September 29, 2020, Michigan was in 14th place out of 52 Departments at 84.35%. CONGRATULATIONS! KEEP IT UP. In the Big Ten, Michigan is in 3rd Place, Minnesota is in 1st place and Wisconsin is in 2nd place. MICHIGAN Needs 5,694 Members to ACHIEVE 100%.

This year's National Convention will be in Baltimore, Maryland. The dates are July 31st through August 5th, 2021. Information will be posted on the convention website at www.vfw.org/convention.

As of September 25th, 2020, there are currently 41 Posts under suspension, one of which is new. There was one new submission for a Post consolidation and one Post processed pursuant to Section 209 of the National Bylaws. There are 6,074 Active Chartered Posts.

Administrative operations is engaged in 15 Article IX Disciplinary Actions, seven Administrative Actions and five pending membership eligibility challenges.

This past week, National received 17 New Bylaws/Articles of Incorporation submissions in for review. National also reviewed and approved 18 total Bylaws/Articles of Incorporation submissions and currently National has 19 submissions pending review and approval. Current turnaround time on Bylaws/Articles of Incorporation submissions is approximately 14 days.

I told you at our Fall Conference 2020, that I wanted to be transparent with all of you. I have been communicating with our Department Council of Administration on a weekly basis. Thank you again for electing me as your National Council of Administration Member representing YOU and the Department of Michigan for 2019 through 2023.

Thank you for supporting me and donating to my campaign for National Junior Vice Commander-in-Chief 2023-2024. I appreciate every Post and Auxiliary that continue to have fundraisers for me or send donations to Su-jen Mauldin at 214 Endwell, Novi, MI 48377. Thank You All!

How the MVAA shows dedication to veterans every day

This month I’d like to focus on our recent interaction with Gulf War veteran Michael Kuta – an interaction that truly reflects what the Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency is all about.

Early this year, Kuta was working security at music festivals across the country and loving his job. Then, on March 10, the coronavirus pandemic shut down public gatherings and put the former active duty Marine out of the position he had held for three years.

The 51-year-old Southfield man, armed with a communications degree from the University of Michigan-Dearborn and years of experience in marketing and security, tried unsuccessfully for more than four months to find a good job with benefits in the pandemic-ravaged economy.

Feeling somewhat desperate, and with his unemployment benefits running out, Kuta called the MVAA’s 1-800-MICH-VET hotline on Monday, July 27. Two days later, on Wednesday, July 29, Kuta had a managerial job, with benefits, as a road supervisor for Detroit-based City Shield Security Services.

“My first shift was that Friday,” Kuta tells us. “It was a good week.”

Kuta’s “good week” highlights what the MVAA is all about. As the state-run coordinating agency for Michigan’s 550,000 veterans and their families, the MVAA often gets confused with the federal VA. But unlike the VA, the MVAA does not directly provide veteran benefits. Instead, the agency was set up by state leaders in 2013 as a one-stop resource center to help veterans navigate the labyrinth of veteran-centric organizations and ultimately get connected to benefits they

earned for their service.

In Kuta’s case, his call to 1-800-MICH-VET was answered by Rebecca Allen in our Veteran Resource Service Center. Allen, an Army veteran, contacted David Dunckel, one of our analysts and a retired Command Sergeant Major, who promptly called his contacts at City Shield Security Services. City Shield is one of Michigan’s 400 Veteran-Friendly Employers, meaning it’s committed to recruiting, training and retaining veterans. Turns out, the company was looking for a road supervisor to run its after-hours operations, and Kuta fit the bill perfectly.

We can’t always help get a veteran a job in two days, but we promise to do our best to help every veteran with their needs – whether that’s in employment, education, health care, disability benefits, emergency assistance or


other qualify-of-life areas.

From the technicians who handle the calls to our hotline, to the analysts who work with employers, universities, health care providers and other organizations, to the accredited Veteran Service Officers who help veterans file for benefits, our entire team is committed to serving veterans and their families.

Perhaps Dave Dunckel, the MVAA analyst who worked with Kuta and City Shield, puts it best:

“Saying you support veterans is one thing, but actually supporting veterans is something completely different. Our agency shows this dedication to veterans every day. The teamwork we have within the MVAA and the relationships we’ve built around the state is testament to this mission.”

people who understood them and who shared their concerns. We must never forget why the VFW exists.



crutches is why I assuming it took place in August or September. All the men were in the 3rd BN Co. I 2nd Marines in Jul 1942.



Be specific – do not exaggerate – just the facts. Be like Sergeant Friday on "Dragnet" – just the facts.

Commander Napoleon is the widow of Terrill Napoleon, Sr., an army veteran, who served in Korea where he contracted a brain infection which took his life in 1995.

Commander Napoleon is the proud mother of her daughter, Ms. Ti'Kyra Napoleon of East Lansing, Michigan. Commander Napoleon is an accredited service officer with the Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency (MVAA). As a member of VFW Post 9931, she served as Service Officer, Adjutant and Senior-Vice Commander. Commander Napoleon was the first black female to hold the position of Post Commander at the Wallace C. Schultz/Dwight A. McKinney, Jr. VFW Post 9931 and the first black female Post Commander in the State of Michigan.

Commander Napoleon said it was obvious to her that many veterans within the city [Saginaw] had a lot of problems. She had to be that advocate for them and help them, and she was invited to join VFW Post 9931. The Bridgeport, Michigan, Wallace C. Schultz/Dwight A. McKinney, Jr. VFW Post 9931 serving Bridgeport and Buena Vista, was not always a combination of two names. Commander Napoleon was instrumental in adding the name Dwight A. McKinney, Jr. He was from Saginaw, Michigan. She said McKinney was one of the youngest and among one of the first African American soldiers killed in Vietnam. Since joining the Post, Commander Napoleon has moved up the ranks. "There was a time when women didn't have a place in the military. There still are barriers, but these barriers are being torn down and it's an inspiration," stated Commander Napoleon.

She went on to say that the challenges we face as a nation related to racial inequality and injustice are significant. "These roots of inequality and injustice go as deep as our nation's founding, but they are not beyond the power and determination of committed people for positive change." Commander Napoleon asserts that she will do her best to support veterans by leading in "honoring our past, uniting our present, and mentoring our future with vision, integrity, structure, and accountability, VISA."

Horace Frazier, Jr., Past District 6 Commander and Past VFW Post 423 Commander (Ann Arbor) and a friend commented, "She is a wonderful person and is an exceptional commander and committed to the VFW organization."
