### Last Identified Michigan POW/MIA



On May 30, 2025, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency identified the remains of U.S. Army Pfc. Harold Beryl Dulyea, missing from the Korean War.

Dulyea entered the Army from Michigan and served in F Company of the 2nd Battalion, 5th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division. On July 24, 1950, F Company was sent to rescue members of units that had been cut off from American positions during the Battle of Yongdong, following American losses in the battle over the city of Taejon. While advancing up a hill during this mission, the company was met with intense enemy fire, and in the confusion that followed, several small parties were separated. Dulyea was taken prisoner at some point during the action and marched north to Seoul, where he and other prisoners merged with a larger North Korean People's Army supply convoy destined for Pyongyang. On Oct. 10, 1950, near Suan, North Korea, allied fighter planes bombed the convoy, unaware that American soldiers were among its vehicles.
